



Physical Education by Stephanie Hamer

By the time you read this, all the third and fourth graders will have completed their mile run. Their objective was to finish it - and they were awesome! They will run the mile one more time in the spring, with the hope that their times will decrease. Basketball is the focus for the month of December.

We realize that many children already play basketball outside of school, but in physical education there are children who are new to the sport. They work on the basic ball handling skills, and many small-sided games. The goal for the children is to improve their basketball skills, whether experienced or new to the sport.

The younger children will spend their PE time on ball skills using both their left and right hands. We continue to have them move safely around the gym playing different types of tag games. At this point in the year we see them confidently choose a partner, and not get upset when it's time to change partners. Socially they seem comfortable with their classmates, and have fun with the games. When confronted with a problem they know to try and settle it themselves playing rock,paper, scissors which usually works.

The children will also use other manipulatives such as bean bags, and hula hoops so don't be

Strategies and teamwork are important parts of this unit and discussed during the PE time. It is good for them to have fun during the class, but important to move safely. We use the warm-up time to improve their levels of fitness: cardiovascular; flexibility and strength incorporating the climbing wall; jump ropes; and running.

Over the last few weeks our area has experienced a sudden drop in temperature. Many students come to school, however, improperly prepared for the sudden cold. Many children arrived at school wearing only sweatshirts or lightweight jackets. We will be going out throughout the cold winter months as often as possible. It is imperative that the children have the proper clothing to maintain their body heat and to protect their skin.

Have your child wear a number of layers of clothing that can be easily removed if they get overheated while in the building.
